Financing the Global Fund to Fight AIDS, TB and Malaria in 2007-2008

Fact sheet

The Global Fund is a critical tool in the fight against the three devastating diseases of AIDS, Tuberculosis (TB) and malaria, which together kill 6 million people a year—that's more than 16,000 people dying each day of treatable and preventable diseases. Since its creation in 2002, the Global Fund has committed US\$ 7 billion in 136 countries to fight the three diseases - US\$ 2.6 billion of which have been granted to 117 malaria programs in 85 countries to support interventions.

The Global Fund is Delivering Results

As the Global Fund enters its fifth year of operation, it is fulfilling its promise as an innovative and effective financing mechanism in the fight against AIDS, TB and malaria. The table below details the results generated to date and shows increases in the last year.

The Global Fund needs additional funding to match the growth of the three diseases

The launch of a new funding round – the seventh in the history of the Global Fund - will enable malaria endemic countries to seek (further) funding and continue existing successful programs such as distributing insecticide-treated nets and implementing ACTs.

Finance

Following the launch of a new round, grant proposals are submitted by countries to the Global Fund, and evaluated by an independent Technical Review Panel. Proposals of high quality are recommended to the Board of the Global Fund for approval. The Board approves programs for two years, with an option to renew funding for a second three-year phase if the programs achieve targeted results.

The deadline for submission of grant proposals will be 4 July 2007 and the grants recommended for approval will be presented to the Board at its sixteenth meeting, on 14-16 November 2007.
